Dear Friends,

I write this on the Feast of All Saints. I'm a little hung over from all the chocolate I ate last night. Although we had quite a successful Trick-or-Treat night, we shut down about 8:30pm, and the leftovers called to me until I caved. Lucky for me, Wanda will take the rest to school to pass out to teachers and students. At this point, better them than me.

This Sunday, we will celebrate the Feast of All Saints in our Eucharist. We will remember those on whose shoulders we stand. While we won't be able to name them all, we recall their lives, their work, and their messages to us who come after them. Whether it's the prophets and heroes of the Hebrew Scriptures or the Apostles and Saints of the 1st Millennium, we will celebrate the faith that they passed along. So much of what we do daily & weekly is a direct result of their lives. The Eucharist itself was developed by those who held onto and repeated the words of Jesus, "Do this in remembrance of me." The Apostles claimed the words of Isaiah who said, "The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the LORD's favor," They carried these ideas forward.

I believe that our lives are given to us for the same purpose. We are to coax life and joy out of a world too often given over to cynicism and greed. We are to claim the hope of Abraham, the tenacity of Esther & Ruth, the truth telling of Isaiah and the prophets, the joy of Jesus, the imaginations of the Apostles, and the courage of Martin Luther King, Jr. We claim the sacrifice of martyrs, the vision of scientists, and the

inspiration of artists. We claim and celebrate them all, because we realize that our lives have been enlivened and enriched by them.

On Sunday, we will also celebrate the Feast of All Souls. In that Feast, we remember those who have lived more quietly, those whose names haven't been recorded in books. Because, "these also were godly men, whose righteous deeds have not been forgotten; their wealth will remain with their descendants, and their inheritance with their children's children." These are folk like you and me. They also looked toward God and the servants of God who inspire us and call us to more than we thought was possible or more than what we have become. These are our mothers, fathers, children, partners, ancestors, teachers, friends, and personal heroes who have gone before us. These are they who made us better. They coaxed life and joy out of us when we thought neither was possible.

My hope as I approach the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls is that I will claim what they gave. My hope is that I will honor them by carrying on what they eventually had to lay down. My hope is that I can refuse to settle into my "better them than me" post Halloween hangover. My hope is that I continue to do all this in remembrance of Christ and continue to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners. My hope is that we all claim this and carry it on for those who are with us today and those who will come after us tomorrow. Please know that I remain...

Las Posadas

Advent I: December 13 at 6:00pm

Las Posadas is a Latin American tradition celebrated in the weeks leading up to Christmas. Typically celebrated in neighborhoods and homes, we remember the Holy Family's search for and need of sanctuary in Bethlehem at the time of Christ's birth. What happens is people gather and process around an area or neighborhood, knocking on (prearranged) doors where they are turned away, until they come to the host household, where they are welcomed in the name of God. There is then a service of songs, brief Scripture readings and reflections, and Advent/Christmas carols sung with bilingual gusto. Then potluck and fellowship. It'll be Great!!
